

FEBRUARY GENERAL MEETING (Pre AGM)

Peter Janezic was ratified as new member. Councillors Jo Gash and Patricia White attended the meeting. The Events Committee advised that due to the bush fire crisis the 2019 Carols Event was cancelled, however Lynn McDonald advised there will be an Easter Event on Easter Saturday with the same market stall holders. She also confirmed that all of the sponsors had agreed to support the event.

We are waiting for the completion of the second Indigenous Carved Pole before we install them on the Headland Path. The CBCA expressed concern with the closure of Forrest Road to hold two events in the one month. Subsequent discussions with Elite Energy disclosed that the first event was organised by another overseas company. With regard to the Callala Triathlon, the CBCA recognised this was a long standing event and had no wish see it cancelled as it brought many visitors to the Callala District with benefit to our local business'. However, we were critical of the Council's role in allowing both events to continue especially with the road repairs on Coonemia Rd which was the nominated alternate route with the closure of Forrest Road. This matter to be discussed with Council.

The meeting closed to allow the AGM to proceed. AGM Results

o Bush fires- 3 deaths, 76% of Shoalhaven impacted, houses damaged and outbuildings lost, bridges lost and damaged. Small business have been impacted, due to loss of business caused by fire damage and loss of income from tourists not coming to the Shoalhaven, and have had to reduce staff numbers. Water bills and usage has been high due to people watering houses, Council are to determine impact of water rates.

• Water restrictions – dams are full and water restrictions are removed.

I am sure that many of those ancient people who heard Jesus talk about living water and not ever being thirsty again, just turned their heads, walked on by, maybe with no real understanding at all.

John 7 records Jesus' attendance at the annual Festival of Booths, or Tabernacles. This autumn harvest festival (Lev. 23 and Deut. 16) in Jerusalem calls the Jews to remember God's provision in the exodus from Egypt and the wilderness, as well as the expected salvation by the Messiah.

During the festival, there were special daily water rituals and at night ceremonies involving light. It was during this festival that we find Jesus making a bold statement about himself and living water. Verses 37 and 38 say, "On the last and most important day of the festival, Jesus stood up and shouted, 'All who are thirsty should come to me! All who believe in me should drink! As the scriptures said concerning me, 'Rivers of living water will flow out from within him'"

Then in John 4, we find possibly the greatest invitational evangelistic story ever told, and it is all about the living water that Jesus can give. As Jesus talked to this Samaritan woman at the well that day, he offered her more than the earthly water found in the well. Listen to his words.

"Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks from the water that I will give will never be thirsty again. The water that I give will become in those who drink it a spring of water that bubbles up into eternal life" So, as I lift a bottle of water, I am thankful for the life and health it gives my earthly body; however, I am also reminded that Jesus is the source of all life, earthly and eternal. So, I gladly reach for the "water that bubbles up into eternal life," the gift that only Jesus can give.

As Christian people enter into the season of Lent let us all remember that Christ gave his life for us each of us; all we have to do is put our trust in him and he will give us life giving water. "Jesus stood up and said in a loud voice. "Whoever is thirsty should come to me and drink. As scripture says, 'whoever believes in me, streams of life-giving water will pour from their hearts.' John 7: 37-38.

Medical Report

In the last few weeks, the team at Callala Medical centre has been fielding various questions from the community into the novel Coronavirus outbreak, so this month, I looked into the facts around the disease and the advise from the NSW Public health unit.


What is it? It is a new strain of the common coronavirus which is responsible for many cases of colds.

How dangerous is it? It seems to be slightly more contagious than the common influenza virus, and is much less dangerous than the SARS and bird flu outbreaks that we have seen in previous years.

Who to isolate? The public health unit is current advising isolation for people who has travelled through China to be isolated for 14 days.

Where to seek help? The Public health unit advises any one with fevers or respiratory tract symptoms who has travelled through China in the last 14 days to ring their local ED or GP for advice. Do not present unannounced, so to allow for your treating clinicians to prepare isolation rooms. Locally the ED is first line as there is no private pathology company that is providing swabs for the novel coronavirus.

Garden Club Roundup

Our first meeting for 2020 was held on Saturday February 15th with Vice President Diane Hatherly presiding. It was great to see everyone and catch up after the holiday break.

On a sad note, former members Jean White and Lola Koern passed away. These two lovely ladies will be sadly missed by all of us.

Our guest speaker was Mr Greg Edwards from Sanctuary Point Garden Centre. This is his second visit and this time round he spoke on plants which attract bees. As you probably are aware drought and fires have had an impact on the bee industry. Hives have been destroyed and beekeepers are desperate to find new nectar and pollen sources after bushfires wiped out native flowering gums.

Greg suggested the following plants to attract bees in our garden- Natives, Abelia grandiflora, Buddleia(Butterfly bush) red flowering Callistemon (bees prefer red than yellow), Daisies, flowering Eucalypts, Lavender , herbs such as basil, thyme, lemon balm, Melaleucas (honey myrtle) and Westringia (coastal native Rosemary) which flowers all year round. Greg said that we must be mindful of insecticides and pesticides which are harmful to bees. We should use eco- friendly pesticides only. At his nursery he won't sell anything that is harmful to bees. We need to remember that it's bees which pollinate our crops.

Greg brought in a native bee house which come in various sizes. They can be purchased from his nursery. Greg and his wife Kathy recently expanded and renovated the nursery. All year round they hold different classes (e.g. on roses and camellias) and promote community -based events such as "Artists in the Garden" which showcases local artists.

It is worth visiting Greg and Kathy -their

nursery is situated at 118 Macleans Point Road, Sanctuary Point. We appreciate Greg for being guest speaker, for donating the bee house and for the Q/A session after his talk.

The History of Pets.

We don't know when humans first started keeping pets, it was well before writing was invented, before we had permanent houses or grew crops. It is presumed that as long as 50,000 years ago, hunter and gathers began to form relationships with animals beyond them being a source of food. Selective breeding from the most suitable of these species resulted in domestication. Evidence of the affection between pets and their owners is revealed by archeologists showing many examples of burials with an pet to accompany the owner in the afterlife.

The first know species to be tamed from the wild included bear cubs kept by Native Americans, wolf cubs kept by Inuits, raccoons by the Cochini and Amazon societies kept tapir, agaiti and monkeys. Dogs were domesticated from the Eurasian wolf by several of the European hunter and gatherer societies and then gradually spread around the globe. Cats were domesticated in the Middle East less than 10,000 years ago.

Wild animals kept in human societies were transformed to become more compatible with their owners' practical and emotional needs. This transformation came about when the wild animals began to breed in captivity. The pets best suited to staying with humans would naturally have stayed around and interbred, leading, over generations to genetic modification of the more domesticated pets with a changed temperament to fit better with human requirements.

Domestic dogs' brains contain irreversible differences to those of their ancestors, the Erasion wolves. Domestic dogs can almost effortlessly learn how to interpret and react to human behaviour. Ancient societies believed dogs to have links the afterworld. The burial of dogs alongside their doting masters (and mistresses) shows this belief and is evidence of the affectionate relationships between pets and man for may centuries. Ancient Egyptians loved domestic cats, they are in a lot of their artwork and were companions for aristocratic women. When a cat died of natural causes the whole household shaved their eyebrows as a mark of respect. They were also valued for their skills in controlling vermin.

Pet keeping is now universally accepted in most societies around the globe.



There are several television shows that highlight including, old restoration; homes, barns, memorabilia from years ago and motor vehicles. What we often see is an accumulation of years of neglect. Items stored for years may only require a dust and polish to bring them back to their former glory. Others, after years of neglect damaged by the element, now exhibit signs of rot, rust, or other forms of corrosion. The degree of damage will reflect the amount of time, expertise and finances that will be necessary to make them once again functional; and something that reflects the beauty of their past.

Whether seeing an old house, or a motor vehicle, or an old machine being restored, the other element that will need to be present is someone with the passion to see the process come to completion. Expertise without passion sees projects abandoned, left alone, continuing to deteriorate, maybe ending as rubbish or flattened by a bulldozer, making way for something new.

In my privileged position as a Pastor I get to sit with people as they share their stories; and sometimes I hear stories of years of neglect, where others cannot see beyond the broken exterior, sometimes with the young we see the marks of self-abuse, maybe looking into the eyes of sadness and loss of hope. Is it possible for people of passion to see beyond the pain and picture the worth of a soul set free, a person restored to the beauty for which God has always desired? What if we acquired the patience to not give up at the first setback and hung in there long enough to allow the years of neglect to be washed away and rejoice together with the one set free. The Apostle Paul writing to the churches in the province of Galatia writes: "Don't grow weary in well-doing, you will reap if you don't give up," I believe with passion, patience and love there are things we can do to brighten our troubled world and bring hope to those who struggle.

understands our sorrow and desires restoration for all people; David, writes; "You keep track of all my sorrows. You have collected all my tears in your bottle. You have recorded each one in your book". Watching "The Drum" tonight as they discuss domestic violence, one of those participating states that only love can overcome hatred. Perhaps if we took notice of Jesus' call to love not only our friends but our enemies, then the world would be a better place. How then can each of us make a difference? Maybe if we dwelt on the positives more than the negatives; perhaps if we looked for the good in people rather than the bad, and perhaps if we spoke up for the powerless rather than pretending that all is well; and, maybe a smile and a kind word might just make a difference for someone who is struggling. Maybe!

May God grant each of our readers rest from your toil and peace in your heart.

Police Report

Next of Kin program:

The Next of Kin Program helps people living alone to have the contact details of their nominated person recorded at a local Police Station. You may ask, "What's a next of Kin?". A next of kin is defined in the dictionary (From the interweb) as "A persons closest living relative or relatives". It has also been defined as your closest relation, nearest blood relation/relative, closest family member or in the case of childless couples, your next of kin are your parents. So, if you have any of the above hanging around you should read on. If you have no next of kin, a good friend will suffice.

The Next of Kin program records the contact details of your nominated Next of Kin, as well as the nominated doctor, dentist and any medical alerts that would help in an emergency situation. The records will be entered onto a register. Any information provided will be securely stored and only accessed by NSW Police. This information may assist the ambulance and Police in an emergency situation, to contact a relative or other nominated person to inform them of your situation.

But there's more. If you register on the NOK register you will receive not only a key ring but a sticker as well while stocks last (no steak knives). The key ring has many functions, it can hold keys, it has a spot to write your registration number on and it can also be put in your pocket. The sticker can be placed on the fridge or the phone (Not both) to alert emergency services that you are registered in the 'Next of Kin' program. The key ring will also stop any rhinoceros from trampling your vegie garden. What a great device! (Zoo's and Africa excluded. The rhinoceros Claim may not be true)

By now you have probably spilt your coffee down the front of you shirt in excitement. "How do I register?" you ask. It is simple. Just get on the NSW Police website, I generally type "nsw police NOK", a form will come up. You can download it, fill it in and forward it to the Crime Prevention Officer at your local Police Station. So not only do you receive the amazing key ring and sticker, but everything is FREE! The key ring will be forwarded to you via post.

Scams:

If you receive a phone call or an Email offering you untold riches or amazing prizes and you immediately think that it is too good to be true then it probably is. Do not get scammed. What are the odds that you win a fantastic prize that is from a competition that you never entered? (Probably Nil). Don't fall for the sob story that ultimately request money or bank details. You have earned your money, do not give it away. Please get onto the Fair Trading Website on the google net and read all about the scams and what to do.

Glimpses of the Callala District

Compiled by Robyn Florance for the Shoalhaven Historical Society Inc.

Part 1 - 'Honeysuckle Beach'

'Honeysuckle may be had here fit to build a twenty Gun ship down to a boat, I am sorry to observe that land thus far is very bad and no kind of trees worth of notice except aforementioned.'

George William Evans, Surveyor, made this comment about the Callala Beach/Myola area in his journal entry dated 31 March 1812. Evans arrived on the brig Lady Nelson to undertake the first land survey of the Jervis Bay coastline.

He walked from the southern headland approximately to Callala Bay, at the start of the journey which took him up Currambene Creek, across the Shoalhaven river, inland close to the mountain range, to meet the sea near Gerringong. On his sketch map of his journey, Evans gave the name 'Honeysuckle Beach' to the seashore of what is now Callala Beach.

The red honeysuckle (banksia serrata, old man banksia) grows in profusion on the sand dunes and in the nearby bush. The strength and durability of its timber made the tree popular for boat construction; its bark provided a juicy edible sap.

Evans' comment about the honeysuckle trees is the earliest mention of the area. By 1841, the name Callala was in use. The exact date and reason for the change of name from that given by Evans cannot be ascertained.

Callala has two possible derivatives. It has been suggested that an Aboriginal word 'la-la' refers to the satisfaction obtained from plenty of good food, such as the abundant fish and kangaroos in the area; 'Kallala' is an Aboriginal word for fish. Alternatively, the place may be named after a Calala (sic) in Ireland. Patrick Smith - Born Calala Bay, County Longford, Ireland by Eileen Camillus Murphy

Patrick Smith, my great-grandfather, saw the light of day first in Calala Bay, County Longford, Ireland. When he was 18 years of age he and some other lads burnt down a landlord's haystack and he was sentenced to '7years across the seas'. On arrival in Australia he was sent to work for Alexander Berry on the Berry Estate. After serving a few years on the Berry Estate hedwasgivena full partdon and a grand of land - about 30 square miles around Jervis Bay.

The land was called Woollamia and it was here he met Margaret Hogan who was also born in Ireland but who came with her mother to follow the father, an earlier arrival. They had rented a farm from the Berry Estate and settled in a beautiful spot on the north side of the banks of the Shoalhaven River, a site chosen later for the erection of the Shoalhaven Bridge.

The life of freedom was not to be a long one and part of it was very sad and lonely. The centre of Woollamia was cleared and horses and cattle reared - even wheat grown was sent to the first Australian exhibition at the world's fair in Chicago. Patrick's love of horses was uppermost and somewhat good breeds were raised.

Children were born and each given plain names, John, James, Ann and mary. Patrick had taken up more land over Currambene Creek, which flowed into Jervis Bay and this new part which reached to the ocean he named Calala after his old home in Ireland.

When the new baby Mary, was a few weeks old, Patrick escorted his wife to see a new house he had built at Calala. As they went over the fallen tree, which constituted a bridge across the creek, she grew giddy and fell into the quick moving stream. She could not swim and although her husband dived in and brought her out, she was already drowned.

Glimpses of the Callala District

The baby was reared by the grandparents but he kept the others; two boys and a girl, assisted by a Mr and Mrs McLean, who helpoed work a dairy on his property. The butter was salted then put into kegs ans kept until a ship came in. As the ships did not come frenquently one can guess the butter was not too frresh when it arrived in Sydney.

The big interest in Woollamia was the horses and racehorses at Terara homestead and farm had been established. A racetrack was constructed on it and Etienne de Mestre became friends with the Smiths because of their mutual love of the racehorse. Later on de Mastre won the first and second Melbourne Cups with Archer.

That was when the boys were alone on Woollamia because their father was found dead on the bank of the Currambene Creek, quite close to where his wife was drowned. The boys were only thirteen and eleven respectively and Ann was nine. She was sent to some people at Pyree, where a school has been established, but she grew homesick for her old free life at Woollamia and one day decided to walk home about 20 miles.

The boys stayed on a few years at Woollamia and Calala. The property was eventually sold to Eddie Rowe (brother of George Rowe), who became the prime mover of the formation of the AJC. Eddie paid £200 and threw in a gold watch.

I used to wonder as a child when I heard this story, whether the watch was the one Eddie Rowe lost when he was in a boat which overturned at Callala Beach. They told me the watch was washed up on the shore and 'it still went'.

At the same time Gran acquired a long scar on one leg. She said it was caused by a sword fish while she was in the surf. The boys left their sister with her grandparents, the Hogans, at Bomaderry, and found their way on a droving trip to the Northern Territory with Mr Tyson who had numerous cattle properties throughout Australia.

In later years Johnnie lived on the Terara Estate and I only remember seeing him on the back of a racehorse.

Uncle Jim married Jennie Holland and resided at Terara Estate for some years, mainly training racehorses and working a small farm. He became well-known as a racehorse trainer, first at Randwick, where his greatest triumph was in training the winner of the Caulfield Cup -Bronzetti. He had good stables and a very nice home at Randwick when he died aged about 88 years.

Sir Henry Parkes and Callala by Alan Clark

With the Centenary of Federation celebrated in early 2001, much was said and written about the 'Father of Federation', Sir Henry Parkes. Residents of Callala Beach may suspect a local link because of the naming of Parkes Crescent and Sir Henry Crescent in their village.

One of the Australia's best known politicians in the 19th Century, he bought several portions of land at Callala Beach in January 1875, paying the upset price of £1 per acre, for a total of £195.

He had four portions, consisting of 33, 50, 68 and 45 acres on rood, totalling 196 acres one rood. Parkes' land covered all the developed area on the west side of Callala Beach Road.

He did not develop the land, which in 1888 returned to the Bank of New South Wales as mortgagor. Some 40 years after Parkes' initial purchase, this land was selling at around £250 for a waterfront block.

Glimpses of the Callala District

Parkes had served as the Member for Kiama (1864-1870) indicating he was familiar with the South Coast, but any visits to Callala Beach would have been by sea. As Premier and Colonial Secretary, he made an official visit to Shoalhaven in November 1888.

His party came by special train to the end of the South Coast Railway line at Kiama, and was transported the rest of the way in a comforable double-seated, hooded buggy driven by Robert Thornburn. Mounted troopers in the charge of Sergent Alfred Sykes provided an escort.

After travelling over the dusty roads, there was a pause at the Great Southern Hotel, Berry where Broughton Creek and Bomaderry Mayor Lewis McIntyre greeted the visitors.

Sir Henry was feted that evening at a banquet attended by 200 people. addressing the gathering, he promised to push for women to be given the vote and to extend the railway to Bomaderry.

Next morning inspections were made of the Recreation Ground, courthouse and cemetery, before the visitors boarded the steamer Coomonderry at Shoalhaven Wharf, for the trip to Berry.



Coronavirus Info

On 31 December 2019 the World Health Organisation was informed of a cluster of cases of pneumonia of unknown cause in Wuhan City, Hubei Province, China. These cases were later determined to be Novel Coronavirus. The outbreak quickly spread within Wuhan and to other major population centres in China with cases also recorded in other cities around the world.

On 30 January 2020 the World Health Organisation declared the event a Public Health Emergency of International Concern. Updates to the Australian Government's response are online here.

What is the Coronavirus?

Coronaviruses are a large family of viruses that are commonly found in mammals such as bats, rodents, and civets. The internal 'make-up' of the virus means they can easily change, and sometimes they evolve to the point where they can be transmitted from animals to humans; sometimes they evolve further and can transmit from human to human.

What are the symptoms?

The virus can cause a range of symptoms. Symptoms can range from mild illness to pneumonia. Affected people may experience:

• fever

• flu like symptoms such as coughing, sore throat and tiredness

difficulty breathing

If you become unwell and suspect you may have symptoms of Coronavirus, you must seek medical attention. It is a good idea to ring ahead of time to book your appointment. This will help make your doctor aware of your symptoms and your travel history.

Phone 000 if you need urgent medical help.

Previous outbreaks of Coronavirus, including the most dangerous outbreaks to date, have spread primarily through close contact with ill people and with infectious droplets created when ill people cough or sneeze. Touching an object or surface where the virus has been deposited, such as doorknobs or personal belongings, and then touching your mouth, nose or hands without washing first can also spread the virus.

What precautions should you take?

People should continue to take ordinary health precautions as they would to prevent the common cold or influenza - particularly washing their hands on a regular basis. Federal and State governments are providing advice on their websites, predominantly for travellers, including directions for parents to keep their children home from school if they had been to China in the past two weeks. Those people who are travelling should observe the Federal Government's Smart Traveller website warning Australians against travel to the entirety of China. If people think they have been exposed to the Novel Coronavirus and have serious concerns about their health, they should contact their local health professional or ring HealthDirect on 1800 022 222 to receive a health assessment.

How can you reduce the risk of the Coronavirus infection?

There are currently no vaccines available to protect you against human Coronavirus infection. The most important key prevention messages are similar to those for influenza or other respiratory borne viruses: wash hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or use alcohol based sanitizer; avoid touching mouth, nose and eyes with unwashed hands; avoid contact with people who have cold or flu like symptoms. If unwell, stay at home while sick, and cover mouth with tissue when sneezing or coughing, then throw the used tissue in bin. Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces.
