



The CBCA recognised the contributions of these outgoing members: Sandra McKenzie-Clarke, Raymond Plevey and Brooke Black, and thanked them for their service to the Callala Community.

Duncan Marshall, Anthony Janezic and Howard Duncan attended the Shoalhaven City Council (SCC) Economic and Development Committee meeting to promote the rejection of the proposed development of a section of land in Sealark Rd. Although a sound strategy was argued, the Council members attending, decided by a small majority to allow the proposal to proceed to the State Government for a "Gateway Determination". This means the proponents will have to submit a case for development before any approval can be given, including extensive Environmental Impact Studies (EIS). They will need to satisfy the Office of Environmental Heritage, National Parks and the Jervis Bay Marine Authority about any impact on the Wowly Creek, as well as Council subsequently considering any Development Applications (DA).

The CBCA also considered a DA from Callala Community Gardens (CCG) and have asked them to clarify/amplify several matters covered in the Application.

The Liberal candidate for the Federal seat Gilmore, Mr Warren Mundine also attended the CBCA meeting and provided an insight into his background, as well as presenting what he considered to be the most urgent and pressing issues in our electorate.

The CBCA congratulated the Events Committee on the 'Speakeasy Night' held at Club Callala recently. Many of those attending dressed in a theme depicting the fashions of the era. The first quarter of 2019 has already gone, and the CBCA's priority remains the completion of the Path Enhancement Project. The CBCA is still waiting on the application to vary the Aboriginal Heritage Impact Plan (AHIP) to install two

Indigenous Carved Poles and a carved bench at the Callala Headland. This CBCA Project also includes the extension of the path where it presently ends near the Marine Parade Turnout (near Bay Street intersection). This path will allow access to the Headland for wheelchairs, scooters and prams. During this time the CBCA will commence the installation of additional picnic tables and individual bench seats on the foreshore and along the adjacent to the path to the Headland.

Our next meeting is Wed, 10 Apr 19 at the Callala Community Centre, Emmett Street starting at 7:00pm. Everybody is welcome, you don't have to be a member to attend.

#### Front Page Story - Sealark Road Proposed Development

#### Duncan Marshall

Proposed rezoning of land to the east of Sealark Rd for residential uses.

Report to Callala Bay Community Association, Wednesday 13 March 2019

Following the vote taken at February's General meeting of the CBCA, the Council report was published, with a well-reasoned recommendation to reject the application.

"That Council:

1. Not proceed with a Planning Proposal to rezone Lot 5 DP 1225356, Sealark Road, Callala Bay to a mix of residential, recreation and environmental zones.

2. Advise the proponent and submitters of this decision.

3. Advise the proponent of the opportunity to make a submission during the upcoming public exhibition of the Shoalhaven Growth Management Strategy."

Howard Duncan, Anthony Janezic & Duncan Marshall attended the 5 March Development and Environment Committee Meeting, where Patrick Mahedy (consultant for the developer) and Duncan (for the CBCA) each made a brief presentation - for and against the rezoning.

The Council officers' report identifies that the applicant has submitted a large number of nonfactual statements and erroneous planningdocument interpretations, out-dated studies, as well as failing to follow recommended process.

The officers' report concluded that the rezoning submission "is inconsistent with the strategic plans for the Callala Bay area. It is recommended that the PP not be supported."

The 8 councillors' vote to support and proceed with the Planning Proposal as submitted, appears to be plainly contrary to the intent of the adopted legal planning policies.

This Committee vote, which should be submitted

to Council on 26 March, does not permit rezoning and sub-division. It will allow the applicants to put their proposal to the state planning department for a "gateway determination."

Then, if agreed in general, the proponents have a lot more studies to prepare and arguments to present before they can proceed. The CBCA and individual citizens will have more opportunities to respond to the rezoning proposal.

Unless withdrawn, this rezoning proposal now progresses to "Gateway determination". After that, the Planning Proposal may or may not proceed. The 5 steps are:

1. Planning proposal....

2. "Gateway – the Minister (or delegate) decides whether the planning proposal can proceed (with or without variation) and subject to other matters including further studies being undertaken, public consultation, public hearings, agency consultation and time frames. A planning proposal does usually not proceed without conditions of this nature. The conditions are then complied with and if necessary, the proposal is changed."

3. "Community Consultation – the proposal is publicly exhibited as required by the Minister. A person making a submission may also request a public hearing be held."

4. Assessment – the planning proposal authority reviews public submissions.

5. If approved, the planning decision is published and becomes law...

Meanwhile, I will recommend that CBCA vote to write a letter asking Council to issue an immediate "cease and desist" direction to the land's registered owners (individually) that no further works be undertaken on the property without due Development Application and Council approvals, especially no works which would be contrary to the land's present zoning of E3. The works to be banned should include, but not be limited to, earthworks, drainage, clearing, slashing or any other disturbance of vegetation.

#### **South Coast Vet Report**

What is "Parvo" and should I have my dog vaccinated?

"Parvo" is short for Canine Parvovirus(CPV). CPV is a viral infection that is present globally. The virus affects domestic dogs causing severe gastroenteritis that is often fatal. It is estimated that 20,000 cases of CPV are diagnosed by veterinarians annually in Australia. Dogs infected with CPV show a range of symptoms from sub clinical (this means you do not even notice any illness), to mild gastrointestinal signs (some vomiting and diarrhoea), to a very fast developing disease where they can die soon after contracting the virus. The severity will depend on the dog's immune response.

Treatment of infected dogs involves intensive care to replace fluids and electrolytes lost from the damaged bowel. The treatment of dogs and puppies with CPV is often heart breaking as it is such an aggressive virus that the treatment is more often not successful and there is always the frustration of knowing it is a disease that could have been prevented by a simple vaccination. Dogs which are infected with CPV shed virus in their faeces and the virus then survives well in the environment for years as a potential source of infection to other dogs.

CPV vaccines are among the most effective of veterinary vaccines. If the mother of a litter of puppies has been vaccinated against CPV she will provide antibodies in her milk that will protect her puppies against CPV while they are suckling. At six weeks of age when the puppies are being weaned they should receive their first vaccination against CPV. During the period between the first and second puppy vaccinations, puppies should be kept away from any potential sources of infection as it is not until the second vaccination is given at 8 to 10 weeks that the puppy is safe to explore the whole environment. All puppies should then receive a 3rd puppy vaccination at 10 to 12 weeks.

Improved vaccines and vaccination protocols help provide protection against CPV to puppies at the earliest possible age. Puppies can now complete their three puppy boosters as young as 10 weeks. This means they are able to socialise at 10 weeks of age. Exposing puppies to as many different people, places and other animals in their first 3-4 months of life is really important for their psychological development. Early socialisation and puppy pre-school greatly reduces the incidence of behaviour difficulties, like, aggression, fear and anxiety conditions. Adult dogs should receive a yearly vaccination against CPV.

#### **Callala Anglican Church**

A young Pakistan Christian man from a poor family was arrested and charged with murder on the basis that he was tall, like one of the four suspects. He had been at work when the murder was committed but, without money or influence he could not hire a good lawyer. At his trial no witness from his work place was called to disprove the false accusation and he was found guilty. The normal sentence for murder in Pakistan is hanging. But because no one could positively identify this man, the judge found his faith in Christ carried him through both the period before the trial when he feared getting a death sentence and afterwards when decades in jail stretched before him.

The man saw the great need around him and decided that he would seek to help those like himself caught in a hopeless situation.

#### **Anglican Church**

For those on death row he would speak to them of hope and forgiveness in Christ, he would walk with them to the gallows or even carry there the ones who collapsed. So great was the mans faith that he petitioned the authorities to have a Christian gathering for the Christian prisoners and the Muslims also attended. He then got permission for a church building which he and other Christian inmates constructed with their own hands. All the while he was spending time reading in the prison library which is how he discovered he could appeal. Slowly he put together his cae, and ten years after behind bars he was released on bail. It was another five years before he finally cleared his name.

On being released the man married his fiancée who had waited a decade for him. After two years of happiness together she died in childbirth. The man put aside his sorrow and continued to serve prisoners, particularly those on death row, travelling all over Pakistan to help and encourage them.

The man's experience of false accusation and expecting death sentence is not dissimilar from another Pakistan Christian. Aasia Bibi who knew well what it was to suffer as her Lord had suffered, to be falsely accused, to be beaten up, spat upon, imprisoned tried, found guilty and sentenced to death. Throughout is all, she remained faithful to her Lord and confident that he would deliver her.

Earlier saints have faced the same appalling suffering as these modern -day believers. One such was Dietrich Bonhoeffer(1906-1945), a German pastor and theologian who stronglt opposed the Nazi regime. From prison Bonhoeffer wrote a hymn which includes this verse.

"And when the cup you give is filled to brimming With bitter suffering hard to understand.

We take it gladly trusting though with trembling Our God so good and so beloved a hand".

This cup of suffering is none other than the cup from which Christ our Lord Jesus drank (Luke22:42).

The agony of Gethsemane, the betrayal wrongful arrest, false imprisonment, beating and torture, the unjust trial, the underserved death sentence, rejection by the crowds, abandonment by His disciples and above all else the terrible moment on the cross when it seems as if the Father had turned away His face causing Jesus to cry out in agony, "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" (Matthew27:46).


The reality of Christian experience is bron of pain and suffering. It is when all has gone wrong and yet we still hope and go on. This is the experience that tests the nature of who we are and the quality of the faith we have. But suffering in this life is not the end. There is hope – the hope of the resurrection is a reality. Jesus died and rose again gloriously. For the man and his wife Aasia there was a resurrection in being released from prison. Countless others who live with false accusations, ignominy and shame and die without being cleared or freed, there is an eternal hope of life with Jesus, where "all shall be well, and all shall be well and all manner of things shall be well.

#### **A Brief History: Shoalhaven**

Alexander Berry, Hamilton Hume and Thomas Davidson made the first recorded ascent of the Pigeon House Mountain in 1822. In August of 1846, Berry's schooner, the Coolangatta was wrecked between Point Danger and Cut Hill, Queensland. This place still bears the name of Coolangatta, linking the Gold Coast and the Shoalhaven with an historical tie. The anchor of the Coolangatta serves as a monument by the beach at Queensland's Coolangatta.

#### **Community Church**

How the year has flown, here I am writing for the April edition of the Callala Bay News. It seemed only yesterday we were packing up Christmas decorations and now Easter is upon us. What does Easter mean? I haven't done any surveys, although the following might be what most people look forward to over the Easter break. For those who make their income from tourism or hospitality would be looking forward to lots of holiday visitors, and a busy time accommodating and entertaining them. For others it is a time to get away, maybe with family or friends, for a time of rest, relaxation or other activities. And, for others it will just be another week like the last one. And, I'm certain for the children there will be a fair amount of chocolate consumed, coupled with hot cross buns.

Whilst the origins of Easter are from a Pagan festival celebrating the coming of Spring, (Northern Hemisphere), from at least within the second century the early church celebrated Easter as a Christian festival, although well before that the early Christians remembered the death and resurrection of Jesus at the same time the Jews celebrated the Passover.

The Callala Community Church celebrates the life, death & resurrection of Jesus most weeks when we share in Communion or the Lord's supper; what then for the Christian church is so special about Easter? Maybe, it is a good time to emphasize the relevance of Jesus' resurrection to our wider community. So, Easter eggs & hot cross buns aside, this was and perhaps should be, a true Holy-day; a time to remember when God provided for all humanity a way of being reunited with Him.

During my journey through life as a follower of Jesus, the one thing I have found to be true is that God is far more concerned with people entering into a relationship with him than mere religious observance of special times and seasons, the Apostle Paul when writing to the church in Rome puts it this way: So, there is now no condemnation awaiting those who belong to Christ Jesus. For the power of the life-giving Spirit—and this power is mine through Christ Jesus—has freed me from the vicious circle of sin and death. We aren't saved from sin's grasp by knowing the commandments of God because we can't and don't keep them, but God put into effect a different plan to save us. He sent his own Son in a human body like ours—except that ours are sinful—and destroyed sin's control over us by giving himself as a sacrifice for our sins. So now we can obey God's laws if we follow after the Holy Spirit and no longer obey the old evil nature within us.

The Federal Government increased drought support of \$1.8 billion will help my local farmers who have been asking for a well organised approach to the assistance and fundraising by all Australians.

The drought response includes the appointment of a National Drought Coordinator, new tax breaks for farmers, low-interest loans and the application form for the Farm Household Allowance is being made easier.

However more awareness needs to be raised about the tough conditions facing our dairy farmers and I'll continue to fight for this on their behalf.

#### **Police Report**

Way back in the olden days when there were no Police, it was up to the community to catch and deal with the offenders who committed a crime. In Ye olde England it was a common practice for the public to chase down and apprehend the offender. This practice was called the "Hue and Cry". Once a felony was discovered and the Hue and Cry went out such as "Stop Thieve" then other members of the community we're bound to take part in the apprehension of the offender.

Once the crook was apprehended he/she was punished. There were a number of punishments in those days ranging from Fines, being placed in stocks, mutilation or death. You only have to watch 5 minutes of Game of Thrones to get the gist of how it was in those medieval days.

Lucky for all of us that we have become more civilised as a community and we now have a Police Force full of dedicated officers who are chasing down the crooks, however we still need people to report the crimes. You do not need to scream out "Stop Thief" any more however you do need to do something. There are a number of ways to report incident to Police. In fact, we are almost spoilt with choices.

#### Ring "000"

This one is pretty much self-explanatory. If you require urgent assistance from either Ambulance, Fire or Police, ring "000". Try to remain calm and supply as much detail as the operator requests. Remember, the operator is dispatching emergency services whilst you are speaking to them so don't think that all the questions being asked will slow the process. The operators need as much info as they can.

#### Contact your Local Police Station.

If you do not require an immediate response by Police or you have a minor complaint you can contact your Local Police Station. Just get on the Google, type in the name of the Police station and Boom, the number appears as if by magic. As they say. Let your fingers do the walking.

The Police Assistance Line

The Police Assistance Line (131444) operates 24hrs a day, 7 days a week.

If you are a victim of a crime, other than life threatening or time critical emergency situations, you should contact the Police Assistance Line (131 444).

Phoning 131 444 allows you to report crime over the phone. Once your report is completed by a customer service representative, your information is immediately available to your local police.

If the crime you wish to report cannot be taken over the phone, due to its serious nature, the operator will assist you by advising where you can go to make the report, or by arranging for police to come and see you.

When a police response is required, Police Assistance Line (131 444) will arrange for police officers to attend.

The Police Assistance Line (131 444) can also assist you with general police inquiries.

By phoning Police Assistance Line (131 444), rather than your local police station, you are freeing up Police Officers who could otherwise be on the street actively preventing and investigating crime in your community.

#### The Community Portal

The NSW Police Force Community Portal is an online reporting system for our community which is easy to use, confidential and always secure. The Community Portal provides an additional reporting channel and will improve the overall experience and satisfaction of our community members for non-emergency reports.

#### **Garden Club Roundup**

The March meeting was also our AGM. We have a new President- Bev Faulkner - as Sue Powell stepped down after 3 years in the seat. Most of the positions have been filled with some new faces and we look forward to working together in 2019. Our AGM always coincides with St Patrick's day so it's only fitting that we wore green and the display table item was the same colour.

Guest speaker was Terry Simpson from South Coast Organic Fertilisers which is a family owned business in Tomerong. Terry has 5 1/2 acres producing organic products mainly from worms. He has 3 types of worms for sale -Rubellus - red worm, Fetida - tiger worm and Excavatus - blue worm, all suitable for standard worm farms.

Some interesting facts about worms- each egg (which resembles osmocote pellets) can produce 6-10 babies. Worms are made up of 80% water, they don't like sun, rain or wind and will eat anything except meat. Terry feeds his worms cow manure sourced from a local dairy. For home worm farms, he recommends that all vegetable scraps be chopped or blended. He said that you should feed worms at the end of the week - not every day. Once a week or fortnightly, he suggests that you fluff the worms gently with a plastic fork before feeding and then adding some lime or dolomite to sweeten the worms. One member asked the difference between earth worms and farm worms- earth worms don't break down the compost quickly. Worms don't like citrus or onions unless the onions are blended with other scraps. The end products of worms are castings which can be used as a soil conditioner and Microbe Concentrate Fertiliser or liquid gold which can be diluted and sprayed or watered on plants. Terry also plants garlic on his property-the Russian or Elephant variety which is larger and sweeter. He plants his garlic at the end of

March and harvests it in late November. He fertilizes the garlic once a month and when it starts to flower, he advises that you snap it off so that the plant puts its energy in the garlic bulb rather than the flower. Terry hopes to return in December with some of this garlic for us to purchase.

We are thankful to Terry for taking the time to visit us again and for donating some worm castings and liquid gold fertilizer for our raffle.

Please note- there will be no Garden Club meeting on Easter Saturday-April 20th.It is the annual Senior Citizen's fete and we are having a plant stall on that day. Hope to see you there.
