- SCC have been approached to provide relief for dumping plastic (tip fees) and removing the light tonnage ban on council roads. SCC cannot legally provide relief from rates (Water or Property) by can enter agreements for payment plans or extensions

#### **Callala Bushcare Group**

During winter, Callala Bushcare volunteers have devoted their sessions to the sites which are difficult to access and uncomfortable to weed during the warmer months, as well as targeting winter-flowering weed species, such as Bitou Bush and Mother-of-Millions. Bitou, a Weed of National Significance, is regarded as one of the worst weeds in Australia in view of its invasiveness, potential for spread, and economic and environmental impacts. Our campaign against the Bitou began in the dunes of Callala Beach where the bright yellow flower heads had alerted us to the presence of half a dozen large bushes.



On subsequent sessions, we went deep into the bush between the back of the Golf Course and the Black Swamp fire trail to an area known to harbour many Bitou in the past. We were not disappointed and located scores of young plants. We were gratified that the bushes had not yet produced much in the way of fruit and were easy to remove. Also, given the very dry conditions, the Black Swamp was dry, and relatively easy to access.

Mother-of-Millions is a widespread garden escape weed in coastal areas. It is poisonous for humans, household pets and livestock.



As the name suggests, this plant is capable of making thousands of new seedlings, either through its seeds, or the plantlets produced on its leaves. In the Callala area, there are sizeable infestations along the dunes in Callala Beach and along Currambene Creek. Unfortunately, this succulent is drought-proof, easy to grow and has a beautiful flower head, making it very attractive to coastal gardeners. It is also a very difficult plant to weed and we ask that gardeners help us by removing Mother-of-Millions from their gardens, or containing them so that they do not spread to infest other areas beyond their gardens.

In between weeding activities, our bushcare sessions in local reserves at this time of year afford us ringside seats to the flowering of many native plant species and the breeding colours and behaviours of our gorgeous local birds.

#### **Garden Club**

President Sue welcomed guest speaker Duade Paton and his wife Erin at the September meeting. Duade is a policeman stationed in Nowra and in his spare time he is an avid bird photographer. He has travelled extensively around Australia and even photographed penguins in Antarctica. At the meeting he treated us to a montage of many years of photographs from our own back yard, Lake Wollumbulla in Culburra. At present, he has photographed 345 different birds mainly at the Lake as it is an amazing hotspot for birds. We saw many birds in their natural surroundings, some taking flight, others feeding on local flora and insects and shots of birds reflected in water. We are so lucky to have such a diversity of bird life on the South Coast.

At the August meeting, the theme for the Display table was" Friendship through gardens". Members had to bring a plant or flower given to them by a friend. As I walked around my garden, most of my plants came from people I love. As member Bev commented, her garden is a "memory garden." I took a small vase of violets. A friend gave me this plant before I moved down here. It's now ground cover in my back garden and when it's in flower I am reminded of my dear friend. Is your garden a memory garden too?

One of the most interesting plants was a Rabbit's foot fern brought in by Shirley and Don Silcox. The rhizomes that grow on top of the soil really do resemble a rabbit's foot. Don and Shirley were given this plant by their Welsh friend 30 years ago. Don keeps repotting it and it is still flourishing after all these years. He has it growing in a hanging basket to show off the furry rhizomes to their best advantage. There are other fury footed ferns such as deer foot fern, bare foot fern and kangaroo foot fern. These ferns prefer bright but indirect sunlight, regular fertilizing and keeping the plants moist-don't let them dry out in summer. Because their foliage is light, the ferns need frequent misting. They do well in soil made up of half potting soil and half sand. The Rabbit's foot fern is native to Fiji.

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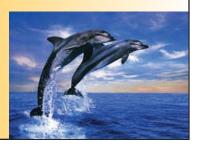
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#### **Police Report**

At some point in our lives' it is more likely than not that you will have contact with a Police Officer. Sometimes the outcome of your contact with Police may be a bummer but on the other hand the next contact you have with Police may be a very positive experience.

We all know what a New South Wales General Duties Police Officer looks like in uniform. Two tone's, Dark Blue Cargo Pants and a light blue shirt with "NSW Police" written on a patch which also includes an eagle within a circle of words "New South Wales Police Force". It's not high fashion but it is recognisable. You should see an equipment belt with a gun hanging off it, maybe a baton, taser or capsicum spray container as well. But what if you were stopped by Person who is not in Police Uniform but claims to be a Police Officer?

A Detective for instance may be wearing a nice suit or dress and be driving an unmarked vehicle. Other officers in other departments are not required to wear the uniform and if you pass them on the street you are none the wiser. However, if you have contact with an out of uniform Police officer or someone who says they are a Police Officer, it is your right to ask that person to provide some identification to Prove that he/she is a Police officer. All Police have been issued with identification in the form of a badge. You can get on the interweb and see what it looks like.

If the alleged Police Officer is unable to Produce any identification then it is very possible that the person you are speaking to is not a Police officer. If you have any doubts as to the validity of a police officer, always check by calling your local police station or triple-0.

Also remember that you can Dob in a Druggie any time you like by contacting Nowra Police or ringing Crime Stoppers.

Do not Drink and Drive.

If it looks suspicious or you feel suspicious about something or someone, give us a ring.

#### **Community Church**

One topic of conversation that is current is the standard of education in Australia, the news reports say we are falling behind many other countries in the developed world. I am not in a position to comment on the truth of this although I wonder by what standard do we measure our performance?

Taken from the internet the Business Insider the following makes interesting reading – Out of the top eleven school systems (Australia doesn't even make the list) Finland rates number one. The question is asked; why so successful? I have included just a small portion of the writer's answer.

It's simple — by going against the evaluationdriven, centralized model that much of the Western world uses.

All children, clever or not, are taught in the same classrooms.

Finland spends around 30 per cent less per student than the United States.

The difference between weakest and strongest students is the smallest in the World.

Perhaps our politicians could take a look at Finland's system, both to save money and have better educated children. But that isn't my point; neither am I an expert on education, although I did spend sixteen years teaching Automotive at TAFE.

I would like us to consider applying these same principles to how we view community and see how they might stack up.

Jesus teaches us that every person has value; or to put it differently every one of us has God given potential. Is the waitress less important than the chef? The best meal in the world can be spoilt by a surly and rude waitress. Service is as important as the product; when both work together we experience a delightful evening dining out. In 1st Corinthians Paul puts it this way; "God's various gifts are handed out everywhere; but they all originate in God's Spirit. God's various ministries

are carried out everywhere; but they all originate in God's Spirit. God's various expressions of power are in action everywhere; but God himself is behind it all. Each person is given something to do that shows who God is: Everyone gets in on it, everyone benefits. All kinds of things are handed out by the Spirit, and to all kinds of people! The variety is wonderful." I wonder how different our community would look if we valued each other equally despite our differences?

The second point from Finland's school system is that all students regardless of ability are taught in the same class; resulting in the difference between the weakest and strongest being the lowest in the world. We all live in the same world. Are we learning and growing together? When I get together within my family, four generations, I am constantly listening and learning from the younger generations, and, I trust they are listening and learning from me. There is a trend in our current culture to only hang out with like minded people; I believe there is much richness and benefit from learning from others who are different from me.

I trust that all our readers are enjoying life. May God bless you all.

We were a tad concerned a few days out with the poor weather conditions, but we worried unnecessarily, our prayers were answered and a beautiful day arrived.

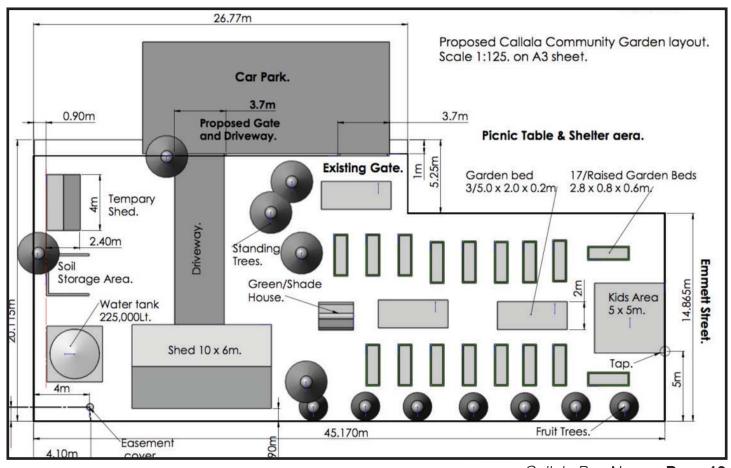
Thank you to everyone who supported this event – over \$1100 was raised.

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#### **South Coast Vet Report**

Common Household Dangers for Pets.

Around the home there are many things that you may not be aware of that can be poisonous for dogs and cats. These dangers can be found in the kitchen, in the garage and the garden and also in your medicine cupboard.

Chocolate, especially dark chocolate and cooking chocolate eaten by dogs can cause seizures (fits), heart irregularities and death. Milk chocolate is not dangerous as it does not contain the toxic ingredient in dark chocolate (theobromine). The toxic dose of cooking chocolate for a small dog is 20g and for a large dog is 120g.

Grapes and raisins are potentially toxic to some dogs (but not cats), they can cause damage to the kidneys and kidney failure.

Macadamia nuts (raw and cooked) are poisonous to dogs. This can be forgotten when they are in cookies or snacks.

Onions and garlic cause damage to dog's red blood cells and a severe anaemia. Be careful not to feed dogs left overs like Chinese take away which may contain a lot of onions and garlic.

Xylitol is the ingredient in sugarless chewing gum, some sweets and some toothpaste and is poisonous to dogs and cats. It causes low blood sugar levels, which can result in weakness, seizures and coma.

Many human prescription medications are dangerous if ingested by pets. Paracetamol (panadol) is very toxic to cats. Cats are deficient in a particular enzyme making them susceptible to liver damage and potential death if they ingest panadol.

Cats are also susceptible to poisoning and kidney failure if they eat lilies (this includes the flowers and the leaves of lily plants in the garden or in flower arrangements). The varieties of toxic lilies include Easter lily, Asiatic hybrid lily, Tiger lily and Day lily. Poisoning causes seizures, vomiting and collapse due to acute kidney failure.

Other more obvious poisons to dogs and cats to be aware of are rodenticides (rat and mice baits) and snail baits. Animals seem to be attracted to these and they are very poisonous to dogs and cats.

Garbage and compost can cause poisoning if eaten and once again, animals seem to be attracted to this.

Marijuana is sometimes injested by pets. It causes behaviour change, a slow heart rate, seizures, coma and cardiac rest.

Please take precautions and keep your best friends safe from dangers in your home.

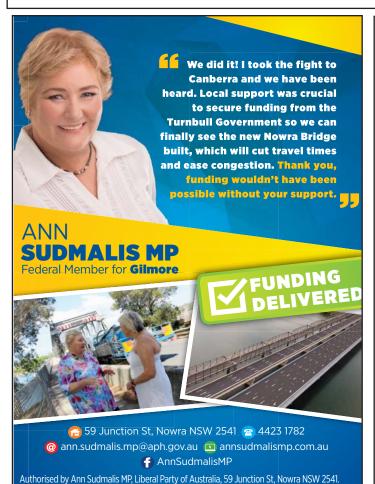

#### **Sweet Recipes of the Month**

#### Garibaldi Slice



Ingredients:
240g currants
150g dried figs (chopped finely)
125ml water
60ml marsala
1 egg beaten lightly
2 tablespoons caster sugar

Pastry:
300 g plain flour
75g caster sugar
185g cold butter (chopped)
2 egg yolks
1 tablespoon iced water

#### Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 180 degrees. Grease a 20cm x30cm pan.
- 2. Make pastry

Sift flour and sugar into a bowl; rub in butter with your fingers. Stir in egg yolks and enough water to make a firm dough. Knead dough until smooth. Divide in half and wrap separetly with cling wrap. Refrigerate for 30 mins.

- 3. Place fruit, the water and marsala in a saucepan, over low heat for 5 mins. Blend or process until smooth. Cool.
- 4. Roll one half of the pastry between two sheets

of baking paper to line the pan. Spread fruit mixture over pastry. Roll remaining pastry and place over fruit mixtures and press dow firmly. Cut pastry into 24 squares, prick with a fork. Brush pastry with with eggwash, sprinkle with sugar.

5. Bake for 30 mins until golden

#### Ginger, Lime and Cashew Shortbreads



Preheat oven to 160 degrees. Line trays with baking paper.

Beat 250g softened butter, 1/4 cup caster sugar and 1 teaspoon vanilla extract in a bowl with an electric mixer until smooth.

Transfer to a large bowl; stir in 1 and 1/2 cups sifted plain flour, in two batches.

Stir in 2 teaspoons finely grated lime zest, 2 tablespoons finely chopped glace ginger, 3/4 cup almond meal, 2 teaspoons ground ginger and 1/4 cup finely chopped unsalted cashews.

Shape level tablespoons of mixture into mounds about 1 inch apart on trays, top each with a whole cashew.

Bake for 25 mins cool on trays.

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#### **Savoury Recipes of the Month**

# Spring Asparagus Soup Ingredients;

450g (about two bunches) fresh asparagus

2 medium onions, diced

1/2 cup (125ml) vegetable stock

20g butter

2 tablespoons plain flour

1 teaspoon salt

1 pinch ground black pepper

1 1/4 cups (315ml) vegetable stock

1 cup (250ml) milk

1/2 cup (125ml) yoghurt

1 teaspoon lemon juice

30g grated Parmesan cheese

#### Method;

Place asparagus and onion in a saucepan with 1/2 cup of stock. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and let simmer until the vegetables are tender.

Reserve a few asparagus tips for garnish. Blend remaining vegetable mixture until smooth.

Melt butter in the saucepan that was used for simmering the asparagus and onions. Stir while sprinkling flour, salt, and pepper into the butter. Do not let the flour brown. Allow the mixture to cook only 2 minutes. Stir in remaining stock and increase the heat. Continue stirring until the mixture comes to a boil.

Stir vegetable puree and milk into the saucepan. Whisk yoghurt into the mixture, followed by lemon juice. Stir until heated through, then ladle into bowls. Garnish with reserved asparagus tips. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese if desired.

# Chicken, Mushroom and Leek Pie Ingredients;

1/4 cup (65ml) olive oil

4 boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut in small pieces

1 medium onion, diced

1 small leek, washed and sliced small

1 tablespoon plain flour

6-10 mushrooms, quartered
1 litre chicken stock, or as needed
100ml thickened cream
1 pinch fresh thyme or dried
375g premade puff pastry
3-4 small potatoes, optional
1-2 bay leaves, optional
1 pinch salt and pepper, to taste

#### Method;

Heat 2 tablespoons of the olive oil in a large pan until very hot. Brown the chicken pieces a few at a time depending on the size of your pan. When they're all done put them to one side.

Add the rest of the oil to the pan. Add the onion and leek, cover then turn the heat down low. Cook for about 10 minutes until the onion and leek are nicely softened.

Add the flour stirring in well and cook until completely incorporated which will take a couple of minutes.

Add a cupful of the stock and stir. The sauce should immediately start to thicken. Add the rest of the stock a little bit at a time until you have about a third left.

Return the chicken pieces back to the pan, along with the mushrooms. If the sauce is a bit too thick add a bit more stock. Add the thyme.

Cook uncovered on a medium heat for about 10 minutes then pour in the cream. Cook for a further 10 minutes.

If you are adding the potatoes, boil them separately and then cut them into smallish pieces. Add to the sauce.

Cook until the sauce has reduced to your preferred consistency. If it's too thick, add a bit more stock to thin it out. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

Pour the sauce into a shallow ovenproof dish and top with the puff pastry. Cook at 200 degrees C for 20-30 minutes until the pastry is golden brown.

CJSS is looking for more students and volunteers. Come on down on Saturdays and Fridays (in November) to check it out. You will be most welcome!! Cheers!!





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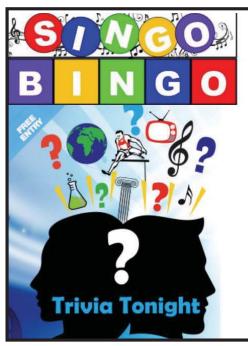

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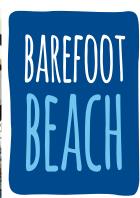












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
