CBCA Monthly Report

The April General Meeting was well attended and saw Counsellor Greg Watson speak on the proposed merger of Shoalhaven City Council (SCC) and Kiama Council. Greg advised that with others, he had sponsored 7 public meetings with 800 people and only 7 or 8 attendees had expressed that the merger would be good for the area. He said that if residents felt strongly, they write directly to the boundaries commission or government representatives and our local member. (For details see the SCC website). Council is currently preparing its annual budget for funding allocated to operation projects and suggested that if the CBCA wanted funding for projects it should make application when the budget goes public.

The closure of the Tourist Information Centre and its relocation to the foyer of the Entertainment Centre drew comments from the floor hat this was an ill-conceived idea. The CBCA will write to the Council to express this opinion.

CBCA member Trevor Smith advised that well-known local indigenous artist Noel Wellington, who recently completed a series of traditional wood scaring artwork on the benches along the Callala Beach to Myola pathway, had offered to create a wooden installation on the Callala Bay Headland adjacent to the Round the Bay Walk. It would depict the Jerringa traditional use of Callala Bay. The meeting endorsed this concept and Trevor will organise a meeting on site with Mr Wellington to explain his proposal and its cultural and historical significance. (More on Mr Wellington's art inside.)

Chisholm Street road work is expected to finish on April 29. Additional excavation to accommodate sewer and water mains have delayed the project. CBCA members raised concerns about pedestrians endangered by road-racing and "hooning". The CBCA will contact SCC and submit suggested traffic calming solutions to Roads and Maritime Services including a pedestrian crossing from the Bay Village Plaza to the skateboard and sporting fields and Community Centre.

CBCA approached SCC to construct a roof over the picnic table at the skateboard park for weather protection. CBCA has also been in touch with SCC regarding engaging a graphic artist to meet with skaters to discuss the design and ultimate painting of the skate ramps. CBCA will continue its efforts to obtain a water filling station to service the skateboard park, the sporting complex and members of the community generally. We hope it will encourage the skaters to keep the area clean of rubbish, especially the ever-present plastic bottles and cans.

Our next meeting will be May 11th at the Callala Community Centre, Emmett St, Callala Bay commencing at 7.15pm for 7.30 pm start. Please join us. All welcome. Tea and coffee provided.

Our Coast, Our Lifestyle



nce upon a time, Callala Bay was a land far far away – 15 kilometres away, in fact. But as sea levels rose over thousands of years, sand was pushed up on the coast, valleys were drowned and our bays, estuaries, lagoons, wetlands and beaches were created. The idea that our idyllic sandy beaches are ancient and constant is a fantasy.

So, what does our coastline mean to you now and how do you value or contribute to it? How does living on the shores of Callala Bay shape your day? How do you want it to be in the future?

Don't be surprised if you get a phone call or a survey from from Shoalhaven Council asking you these questions. It's part of a campaign by council tagged "Our Coast, Our Lifestyle", that aims to connect community members to the work council does to protect and manage our exceptionally beautiful seaside environments. Our Coast, Our Lifestyle has twin purposes:

First is to promote understanding of the custodian role council plays in managing risks to our coast from erosion and storm damage along the Shoalhaven coast. But more importantly, Our Coast, Our Lifestyle, seeks feedback directly from the community to understand how and why people here value the coast to ensure coastal management decisions balance the needs of everyone.

"We tend to assume the beach is where it always has been. But that's not the case," according to Coastal Engineer and Chair of the NSW Coastal Panel, Angus Gordon.

"The dynamic nature of the coast must be built into council's entire thinking. You can't fight nature on the coast — nature is far more powerful."

"If you are not working in harmony with nature, nature will overwhelm you."

Gordon said.

Gordon was speaking in one of a series of videos on the recently launched Our Coast

Our Lifestyle website.

http://www.ourcoastourlifestyle.com.au/

On the website is a survey for Shoalhaven residents to give feedback on coastal values and uses. There you will also find fact sheets and photographs about coastal management in our region plus forums for online community discussion.

Land and property owners play an important role in helping to manage coastal changes and reduce the impact of storms by complying with development approvals and managing vegetation on their properties.

Voluntary community groups like Bushcare are also crucial to coastal protection and maintaining the health of the local habitat.

On the web videos, world champion surfer and surfing instructor, Pam Burridge, voiced the need for accessible lookouts and makes the point that provisions like car parks, actually help to protect the public areas of natural beauty. She also acknowledged the work of council in reclaiming and revegetating sand dunes as well as building storm water barriers and access tracks.

While singer/songwriter Liam Maihi, said in his Vox Pop that living on the coast shapes his music.

"I consider myself lucky to live here."

SHARK PATROL RESTS AMID CORRUPTION CONTROVERSY



Long before sharks were making headlines for cruising close to beaches, the Australian Aerial Patrol (AAP) was watching sharks from their red and yellow aircraft. On ANZAC Day, the charity organisation completed is 59th summer coastal patrol between Sydney and Ulladulla. But explosive new claims, reported on April 27, of money-laundering partnerships with drug syndicates, fraud and tax evasion threaten the charity.

According to AAP General Manager, Harry Mitchell, the accusations are baseless rumours. But the Civil Aviation Authority grounded the AAP fleet in March after corporate sponsorship from Bendigo Bank was frozen, causing AAP's chief pilot and engineer to resign suddenly over lack of payment.

The Middle Eastern Organised
Crime Squad and the Illawarra Police are
investigating several fraud and
misappropriation of funds claims. The NSW
Crime Commission has issued Mr Mitchell
with a court order restraining \$750,000
that was paid in 2014 as a deposit by a
consortium of investors on a the aircraft
training and maintenance arm of AAP. One

of those investors was charged and found guilty of drug trafficking. Police allege that money was the proceeds of crime laundered through the AAP and Mr Mitchell.

Shoalhaven Council are among the sponsors of AAP, as are Wollongong and Kiama Councils. It's alleged that flight logs do not reflect the number of patrols the organisation claims to have completed. But Mr Mitchell told Callala Connection that Despite AAP funding coming entirely from private sponsors, community groups and local councils, this past summer was AAP's busiest yet. Meanwhile, the red helicopter seen over Callala this summer works under the state government's 16 million dollar budget assigned to shark attack mitigation.

"Between September and April, our fixed-wing coastal patrol passed over beaches not the usual 4 times, but 8-10 times each flight," Mr Mitchell said.

"At the peak of summer we flew every day, not just weekends and public holidays."

The crews include one pilot and three observers, one of which is in radio communication with emergency services, police and especially the Surf Life Saving clubs. While shallow water shark spotting is its predominant activity, AAP state that general coastal safety is the overall goal as so many of the South Coast's beaches — as in Jervis Bay - are unpatrolled.

Mr Mitchell says he has been involved in this patrol for 35 years and that the numbers of sharks living and travelling along our coast hasn't changed. Callala's north side of Jervis Bay is particularly

favoured by dusky whalers who favour healthy estuarine nutrient loads to feed on small fish, crabs, octopus, squid or cuttlefish - often roaming across the Bay to Hyams Beach.

What has changed is the appearance of more large migratory animals that were previously uncommon, such as leatherback turtles, schooling cownose rays and seals. Those are the prey attracting the more feared great white, bull and tiger sharks closer to shore and to people.

"I'm often asked where I think an attack is most likely to happen. I'd say Port Kembla Beach - the seal colony there has grown." Mitchell said.

"I love sharks. But really, we don't know sharks at all."

CARVING CALLALA BAY'S STORIES



From a Royal audience in the Halls of the National Museum of Australia in Canberra to the headland pathway in Callala Bay, Noel Wellington is carving his family's history in wood for all to see.

Mr Wellington, a Jerringa artist from Nowra, has already created stunning story-boards out of timber seats along the Callala Beach-Myola pathway as well as in a log monument at the Crookhaven Headland Reserve. His proposal to continue his work

on the Callala headland has been greeted enthusiastically by residents and steps are being taken now to make that idea a reality.

Callala Headland holds a significant place in the memories of Wellington's family for being a vantage point to watch the mullet schools and other sea life. He carves and engraves designs into the wood that reflect the marine life of that place as well as the tradition of Aboriginal tree-scarring. Tree-scarring had a variety of purposes from tool-making to communicating or commemorating special events or sites.

MONSTER WARSHIP IN JERVIS BAY



The Royal Australian Navy's largest and newest warship, HMAS Adelaide, spent two weeks in Jervis Bay this April. While Adelaide's sister ship, HMAS Canberra, was returning from a month in Fiji stocking and rebuilding remote island areas devastated by Cyclone Winston, Adelaide's crew was conducting training exercises for the very same humanitarian aid and disaster relief work. Meanwhile, the RAN continues its internal investigation into the fires last November that started in the Beecroft Weapons Range Impact Zone while livefiring exercises were underway. The fire burned 2000 hectares of the peninsula and came to 700m from Currarong homes.

Bushcare Volunteers

Wet weather and grandparent duties created some disruption to last month's bushcare programme. But we did manage to visit three of our sites.

First we planted more Sea Rush (Juncus kraussii ssp. Australiens) at the "debuffaloed" creek bank near Bicentennial Park, Callala Bay. After planting 160 seedlings in two sessions, we were grateful to have some serious rain afterwards, even despite our use of water crystals.

We then spent another morning at Boorawine Creek Reserve clearing Buffalo and Kikuyu from around the area previously planted by the Callala Bushcare Group. This is inevitably a delicate job as there are also many native plants in the understorey which we strive to preserve, such as the beautiful Maidenhair Fern (Adiantum aethiopicus). Widespread in damp open situations, often along creeks, this fern can form large colonies. To anyone like me who has struggled to keep these ferns alive in a pot, it is always mystifying to see how they thrive in frequently hostile environments.

We also devoted some effort to removing visible Senna seedlings and other escaped garden weeds.

Last week we visited the Bangalay Sand Forest at the eastern end of Callala Beach. This area near Benton Sands was the very first site tackled by Callala Bushcare Group more than 10 years ago.

Back then, the view from the pathway was of dense walls of Lantana extending as high as the tree canopies. Lantana is one of 32 Weeds of National Significance with top priority for removal move because of their extreme invasiveness and impact. So we persisted in hand-weeding the site and, with the help of some industrial-scale poisoning by Council, managed to eliminate the infestation.


However, Lantana seeds remain viable for many years in the soil, and even cut stems left on site (as per bushcare practice) often regenerate as a cutting in the sometimes damp sandy soil. It is therefore crucial to re-visit these areas on at least an annual basis to remove new lantana seedlings.

Despite patches of Lantana, Senna and Passionfruit vines, it was gratifying to see vigorous re-growth of native shrubs, vines, and groundcovers, and to hear the abundance of birds and frogs. Never a bad way to spend a couple of hours on a Tuesday morning!



The call of the green and golden bell frog sounds like a motorbike changing gears.





Callala's young girls may number only a few hundred, but a large proportion of the district's top young Netball players hail from Callala.

Among those stand-outs is Grace Smith (pictured) who was recently selected for the Shoalhaven Netball Association Representative State Age Squad for her third year, along with court compatriot Kyla Kennedy. The pair have been playing together since age 7.



In 2015 Grace was awarded the representative teams' Most Consistent Player as well as Albatross Netball Club's Junior Player of the Year. Plus she was selected to the South Coast Regional Public Schools netball team which played against regional teams from all over NSW at the PSSA State Championship Carnival.

There are several reasons for Callala's particularly strong Netball culture:

Netball is an ideal first team sport, allowing girls to get started with ball skills, fitness and footwork from as young as six. Also, mothers tend to pass on their enthusiasm for the sport. Callala Public school encourages whole school participation in Netball — including the boys. Under the leadership of Principal Therese Aston, Callala PS recently sent four teams to a Netball

NSW Schools Netball Cup carnival where our top team dominated.

But two Callala women in particular have nurtured a group of girls in netball for six years. Accomplished players themselves with Albatross Netball Club, Bronwyn Freeman and Nicole Smith (whose own lifelong friendship began playing netball in primary school) are also dedicated coaches to the next generation of potential champions.

Their expertise shows through the young players. "But I love musical theatre too — it's great fun, it really helps to develop your stage presence, plus you get time to become friends with cast mates.


"There are some amazingly talented people in our area. Performing with them really motivates me to keep working hard."




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
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Backyard Buddies

Got insects? Welcome Swallows.



Welcome Swallows are common but beautiful trilling birds that you're likely to spot everywhere this month as they move closer to urban areas

seeking out winter food. So named because sailors knew they were close to land and fresh water when these birds were sighted, welcome swallows have a distinctive glossy blue back, an orange forehead and throat and a unique long, deeply forked tail. Their voracious appetite for mosquitoes, moths, flies and midges make them a handy partner in the garden - they eat their body weight every day.

Welcome Swallows catch their moving meals spectacularly using their long tapered wings to glide and dive like acrobats. They are often seen hawking their prey above water that camouflages their shimmering dark blue back.

Welcome swallows usually raise two broods of 3-5 chicks each season from August to March and they happily adopt an orphaned chick. They defy

gravity by building mud nests against vertical structures like the walls and eaves of houses, city buildings, barns and rafters.

They line the nests with feathers, fur, twine, wood-shavings bark and even shell and nylon fishing line. When you brush your pet's fur, toss it in the garden as these swallows will happily use it in their nests!
